## Tuesday January 6

### George Kuchar

#### & Other Old 8mm Craziness

Before George Kuchar espoused his labyrinthine aesthetic in 16mm, he was doing it in 8mm. *COVERS OF ETERNITY* (1964), follows a lonely, somewhat neurotic who befriends a woman he meets in a bar. *THE ROOF* (1964) is a rooftop drama set in New York's lower East side of Eden. With Filmmaker Jack Smith, (30 min.) Tonight's program also includes other early 8mm craziness from Kuchar, including *THE GRASSHOPPER*, *THE INCREDIBLE INVASION* (1969-70) about the devastation of San Francisco by a swarm of flying acrobats, and *PREHISTORIC MISH-MASH* where evolution gets itself in a tangle. Also in ROTARY (1972), a 16mm film from 1972, a 16mm horror film of "Nosferatu" proportions, *SOLARIZED RUBBER* (Kira Gale) where a revolving light show turns a dancer into an egg, and four short films by Christine Kuhl including *CARTER'S LITTLE LIVER* and *BLOODED OF THE BULGE*.

As with his 16mm works, his films in Super 8 have influenced many young filmmakers such as Paul Lefevre, Willi Varek and Gordon Hall. Tonight's program features three of Brakhage's 1976 super-8 films: *ABSENTEE PENITENTIARY*, *ETC. ETC.* and *THE DREAM*. N.Y.C., *THE RETURN*, *THE FLOWER*.

Author of *8mm* as diverse as "Puff, The Magic Dragon" and INDEPENDENT FILMMAKING, Lenny was one of the first filmmakers to take advantage of Super-8 sound cameras. Tonight we feature some of his many 1975 Super-8 films: *CHILDREN*; *THE GOLDEN AGE*; *THE FIRST SUPER-8 FILM*; *some features*; and an episodic look at "the wild west"; and *THE STORY OF A MAN (GOING DOWN IN FLAMES)*, the story of Kenneth Anthony Zadek, an American criminal on the lam and living deep in the rain forests of Canada.

### Laura Kipnis

Video artist Laura Kipnis will be present to screen and answer questions about her works. FEATURING ECSTASY UNLIMITED: THE INTERPRETATIONS OF SEX AND CAPITALISM IN 1980S AMERICAN CULTURE. The work explores sexual and economic power relations in the 1980s. The task focuses on three primary intersections of sex and money: prostitution, advertising and sex therapy. YOUR MONEY OR YOUR LIFE (1986) investigates how an atmosphere of pervasively sexualized money plays a role in structuring an revitalizing racial antagonism.

## Tuesday January 27

### Super 8 Urban Verite

In the late 70's 8mm filmmakers began looking at their medium as a vehicle for urban verite documenting society from the point of view of others, workers and voyeurs. This year's *8MM WORLD NOT LISTENING* (David Lee, 1980) is a documentary on New York's street people. Lee's evocative framework merges the city and these particular individuals into a single, mysterious entity. Often called the "post-metaphysical film" in the genre, *SPYING* (Job Libbands, 1978-9), is a perverse, resonant exercise in scopophilia wherein the filmmaker covertly observes his neighbors' daily activities.
