TIME: The Present. The action takes place somewhere in Europe.

ACT I—Scene 1: The Sorel home, early morning Scene 2: The Consulate, several days later.

ACT II—Scene 1: The Sorel home in the evening, a month later.

Scene 2: The Consulate a few days later.

ACT III—Scene 1: The Consulate, late afternoon, several days later.

Scene 2: The Sorel home, immediately following.

SYNOPSIS

John Sorel, fleeing the secret police, stumbles wounded into his shabby apartment. His wife, Magda, dresses his wound and hides him as the police arrive to question her and her mother; they discover nothing. John tells his wife to go to the Consulate for visas. In the waitingroom of the Consulate the Secretary frustrates all attempts to see the Consul by giving out innumerable forms.

A month later, Bagda is still waiting for her visa—her baby is dying. She has a night-mare in which she sees her husband bloodstained and bandaged. The window is broken by a stone—a signal that John has a message for her. The Mother discovers that the child has died. Back at the Consulate a magician hypnotizes the applicants and they dance. Magda arrives, unrecognized by the Secretary, and in a dramatic outburst, condemns the inhumanity and red tape of the Consulate. Moved, the Secretary agrees to ask the Consul to see her. The door of his office opens and the Police Chief emerges. Magda faints.

Magda is again at the Consulate. A friend arrives with the news that John is on his way. Magda sends a note to prevent him returning and leaves. A few minutes later John arrived, followed by the Police Chief, who arrests him.

The last scene takes place in the apartment, where Magda is preparing to gas herself. She sees her husband and all the people at the Consulate; they urge her to join them on the journey to Death, whose frontiers are never barred.
